

#### **My Vocation Journey**

Since early October, I have been living with the Knights of the Holy Eucharist, in Nebraska. I am currently a postulant. While I am still discerning consecrated religious life, I truly believe that I am exactly where God wants me to be. It was God that brought me here. As I look back on my life, even just the more recent years, I recognize that I have only been able to reach the place that I am now spiritually and physically, by the hand of God. When I think about some of the lower places I have been, be it sin or depression, this especially proves true.

I come from a Catholic family. I was baptized as a baby, and I attended a Catholic school from K-4 through 8th grade. I was shy when I was younger, but I was also kind, and I behaved well in school. I was friendly with my classmates and was well known, but I had few friends. While in elementary school, outside of school, I played soccer for multiple seasons. I liked to play outside a lot, often riding my bike or scooter in my neighborhood. During summers, my mother would take my younger siblings and me to go swimming at the public pools on the Air Force Base near where we lived.

For high school, I went to public schools. It was a big change from what I was used to, and I knew few people at the beginning. Generally, I did well with the transition. I got along with the other classmates, mostly. I found places where I could settle in, and I made new friends. My first year was probably my best year. However, it was during high school that I really fell away from the Catholic Church and God.

My return to God was brought about through suffering. Trapped in habitual mortal sin, having conflicts with my family, and being unable to sustain myself financially doing the design work that I was passionate about, described my state for a long time. All while having little thought for God. Truly, I was in a place that my younger self never imagined that I would be.

God especially struck me (and ultimately brought about my reconversion) by permitting the devil to oppress me, especially in my sleep. It was that suffering, that cross, that brought about my return to full union with the Catholic Church. Finding myself low, and in need of help that only God could provide, I cried out to Jesus. God provided the grace to mend my life.

That period of my life was not easy. It was a period of much confusion; a period I often refer to as an "unravelling", for multiple reasons. Looking back now, I recognize without doubt that God worked on me in ways that I would not have imagined, and at that time, would likely not have been able to believe. Thanks be to God I was raised by Catholics, so I knew where to turn to. The Catholic Church straightened things out for me. Proper catechesis is incredibly important.

God has not taken my cross away from me but is forming me to be able to carry it. Through my suffering, I've become willing to suffer for Jesus. My cross encourages me to maintain the state of grace, to receive the Sacraments regularly, and to always seek to grow in holiness.

Admittedly, I don't recall feeling called to consecrated religious life when I was younger. Perhaps because I knew little of that type of vocation. While I did know of the vocation of priesthood, I don't recall anyone talking about consecrated religious life for men. All that said, I did feel called to have good behavior and to be kind. That internal disposition came from God, surely working through good parenting from my mother and father. This was really a call to be a saint, though I believe this was in a way veiled from me.

Before I gave much thought to consecrated religious life, I had already started to live more like a religious at home. I cleaned out my room and became more of a minimalist. I made much effort to detach from sinful and worldly things. The

Holy Spirit radically changed my likes and dislikes during that time, making it very easy to throw away things that I had previously cared much about.

In 2020, I started to discern religious life more seriously, with the help of a "push" from my father. With very little knowledge of consecrated religious life, I went online to find the closest monastery. I found the Monastery of the Holy Spirit in Conyers, Georgia. I wrote a letter of inquiry and started a dialog with the vocation director. I made a total of three discernment trips, staying in their retreat house. For two of the trips, I was allowed to be with the monks, following their schedule, praying, and working with them. I enjoyed the monks, especially those I worked with, and I really loved the property. Even though the schedule was tough, I did plan to go back.

Looking to experience another community, one that was active and contemplative, I reached out to the Knights of the Holy Eucharist. I had a great call with Br. David and a trip was scheduled. Though sadly, after accidentally breaking my right foot, I had to cancel, but with full intent to schedule a new trip after I healed.

Admittedly, it was a very stressful period right after I broke my foot. I needed surgery, but I was without health insurance. Thanks be to God, I was sent to a facility that had financial aid programs where I qualified to have all the surgery costs paid for. God continued to provide for me after my surgery with me eventually getting a temporary work-from-home IT job. That temporary part-time job quickly became a full-time salary job with benefits. The work I did was interesting and called upon a lot of different talents and knowledge that I had gained in the past. I did very well, and I enjoyed that work. However, eventually I was let go because of the lack of projects that they had available. I decided to take advantage of my availability and schedule a discernment trip with the Knights.

During my aspirant visit, it became clear to me that the way the brothers were living was how

I was called to live. Before I went back home, I was invited to return to start postulancy. I gladly accepted.

To write about my time since joining the Knights of the Holy Eucharist will need its own article. This time with the Knights truly is a new stage in my life. I have learned many things and have met so many wonderful people. God has blessed me very much.

I am very happy that God has called me to religious life. When I was "in the world", I tried very hard to become self-sustainable financially by doing the work I was passionate about. I was not interested in making a large amount of money; I just wanted to be able to provide for myself and do good work (creating 3D artwork and animations at that time). However, by giving me a religious vocation, God has given me something better than what I previously wanted. Thanks to our generous benefactors, I am being provided for. This frees me to do the good work that God wants me to do. With the Knights of the Holy Eucharist, I am now able to freely serve others with the talents and gifts God has given me.
